# Catholic School Leadership Action Research Exchange Project

This fall, the Council for School ▲ Leadership (CSL) launched a timely initiative that seeks to broaden our knowledge about impactful school leadership practices that can be shared with system and school leaders across the province. Known as the Star Crossed Alliance, the initiative is an action research exchange partnership with the teachers' organizations of New South Wales and Queensland that is engaging Alberta school principals and district leaders with opportunities to expand their knowledge and leadership skills and share exemplary practices in areas of common interest with one another and with other stakeholders both inside and outside of their schools, jurisdictions, provinces and countries.

The launch of the program has been so successful that the CSL will add three additional principals or district-level leaders to the Star Crossed Alliance, with these participants specifically focused on school or district leadership in the Catholic school environment and partnered specifically with school or district leaders from Australian Catholic schools.

The CSL is now accepting expressions of interest from Alberta K–12 principals or school district leaders who want to participate in this initiative, which is open to CSL members only. It will require a three-year commitment on the part of both the school or

#### Educator Exchange Program

New! One-week exchange for principals within Alberta! Apply now!

The Alberta Teachers' Association and Alberta Education are pleased to offer a short-term exchange for school administrators under the Educator Exchange Programs (EEP).

EEP is offering a week-long job shadow with another school leader in the province. Matches are made based on the topic you wish to explore, and program support is provided by our program throughout the exchange process. Here are some examples of what past exchanges focused on:

- How do other school communities lead a learning community?
- Rural and remote schools
- Inclusion
- Indigenous education
- Instructional leadership
- Leadership development
- ELL, immigration and newcomers
- School culture
- Wellness
- FSL, second language learning, minority languages
- STEM/STEAM
- Technology and innovation in the classroom
- ... and the list goes on!

#### How does it work?

- The one-week job shadow is a reciprocal arrangement. School administrators are matched with a partner administrator.
- The exchange administrators will shadow each other at their respective schools for approximately one week.

#### When does the exchange happen?

 Alberta principals will typically host each other during a break when the other school is in session, usually arranged when spring breaks are offset.

#### How much does it cost?

- Alberta principals are responsible for travel costs, and you are billeted by your exchange counterpart.
- EEP will provide program support throughout the exchange process.

#### Who is eligible?

- Fluency in languages other than English is not required.
- Principals (K–12) must be Canadian citizens, have a permanent teaching certificate and have district approval.
- Applicants should demonstrate flexibility, adaptability, intercultural skills and a strong capacity to act as an ambassador for their school authority and the exchange program.
- Proven communication skills, resourcefulness, initiative and community involvement are all desirable attributes.

#### Where can I go?

 Opportunities exist to exchange within Alberta and to Spain, Germany and Iceland (2020/21).

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#### What Really Matters in Education Systems



ne of the many benefits that comes from having a global perspective provided to us by involvement in a variety of international research partnerships is that it has established the Alberta Teachers' Association as a recognized leader in the field of education around the world. With great power comes great responsibility. The recent PISA test results underscore that Alberta is a genuine "education superpower" worldwide—our system of education is the envy of the world, and we offer an equitable, democratic approach to education that has placed us firmly within the top 10 education systems in the world.

One of the reasons for that success is that, in addition to many systems looking to us in a quest for the "secret sauce" that makes Alberta great, we, in turn, are also constantly looking outward for inspiration from the best practices and brightest ideas in education from across the planet. As part of that practice, we share with you two exemplary podcasts. The first is from Intersection Education.

Intersection Education is an Alberta-

based podcast created by Corey Haley, an Alberta principal. This month we share the podcast episode "Adrian Piccoli, Education from a Minister's Perspective." Adrian Piccoli, former minister of education of New South Wales, has been called by Pasi Sahlberg the best minister of education Australia has ever had. This is a sentiment shared by many in Australia's education system and worldwide. In this episode of the podcast, Piccoli discusses his book 12 Ways Your Child Can Get the Best Out of School and the work he is doing now as professor of practice at the School of Education and director of the Gonski Institute for Education, both at the University of New South Wales. 

#### uLead Conference, April 5-7, 2020

A unique opportunity awaits. Join educational leaders from around the world in April 2020, at the Banff Springs Hotel, for a rare and historic dialogue with the world's leaders in education at Canada's premier conference for school-based leaders, district-level leaders, and provincial and state education leaders.

What does it mean to be a school leader within the teaching profession? The theme for uLead 2020 is Reimagining School Leadership, and it will prompt attending delegates to think about the role of the school leader in leading teacher learning. Particular emphasis will be given to examining the role of the school leader in helping improve teacher capacity, both individually and collectively, as the core capability of a leader of learning, whether as a school principal, a teacher leader or a central office leader. The resulting conversation will

range from how leaders support teachers in continually enhancing their teaching practices to how those leaders develop an understanding of how to design and lead professional learning approaches to have a positive effect on student outcomes and ensure a vibrant public education system for the future.

As always, the conference will feature a wide array of engaging, worldclass keynote speakers. We expect over 1,000 principals, assistant principals, district leaders, national ministers of education and education ministry representatives from around the world to attend. Planning for uLead 2020 is under way and the call for proposals is resulting in a breadth and diversity of school leaders from around the world planning to share their stories. School leaders from Australia, New Zealand, the United States, Denmark and beyond have already registered for uLead 2020. A group of 40 principals from Iceland will be bringing their perspective to the event. 






## uLead Preconference Full-Day Workshop—Saturday, April 4, 2020

Barbara Watterston has extensive experience in education and has held a number of school and executive leadership positions across Australia within the education and not-for-profit community sectors. She specializes in facilitation and research focused on the design and delivery of professional learning programs to develop, enhance and promote the work of the education profession—in particular school and system leadership—to ensure that learning for all can thrive. She has been recognized for her contribution to leadership and professional learning, and she has served in an advisory capacity as a member of numerous university, departmental, school and professional boards.

In Australia, her national research report, *Insights: Environmental Scan Principal Preparation Programs*, contributed to five major national recommendations for preparing future school leaders. As coeditor of the 2010 book *Women in School Leadership: Journeys to Success*, she advocated for women in leadership. In her most recent book, *Step In, Step Up: Empowering Women for the School Leadership Journey*, Watterston provides a practical guide for current and aspiring women leaders through a twelve-week leadership journey.


