This year's Educational Leadership Academy (ELA) will be held at the Banff Centre from July 6 to 12, inclusive. ELA is an annual event, now in its 18th year, and is sponsored by the Alberta Teachers' Association and its Council on School Administration. ELA is an exceptional, five-day, in-residence program for principals, assistant-principals and others in educational leadership positions, as well as individuals who are aspiring to leadership positions.

Dr Todd Whitaker is a professor of educational leadership at Indiana State University. Prior to his professorship, he was a middle and high school principal in Missouri. In addition, Dr Whitaker served as a middle school coordinator in Jefferson City, Missouri, where he supervised the development of two new middle schools. Dr Whitaker's work focuses on principal effectiveness, teacher

leadership, change, staff motivation, instructional improvement and middle-level practices. His books include What Great Principals Do Differently: 15 Things That Matter Most; Dealing with Difficult Teachers; Motivating and Inspiring Teachers: The Educational Leader's Guide for Building Staff Morale; Dealing with Difficult Parents (and with Parents in Difficult Situations); Teaching Matters: Motivating and Inspiring Yourself; and Feeling Great! The Educator's Guide for Eating Better, Exercising Smarter, and Feeling Your Best.

Alberta Education's Severe Disabilities Realignment Review: Moving Forward

Over the past few months, Alberta Education conducted a Severe Disabilities Realignment Review. The review focused on funding requirements and documentation in the files of nearly 17,000 students whom jurisdictions had identified as having severe disabilities. Overall, this review concluded that jurisdictions are providing a wide range of services to a broad range of students. The review also concluded that there is a disconnect between current funding mechanisms, coding criteria and the desire of jurisdictions to be flexible in providing programming and services to students with special education needs.

Alberta Education, under the direction of the deputy minister, will be using the review as a springboard to further examine options to provide funding to school authorities to help them serve students who have special education needs.

School districts will have to play a pivotal role in developing a new framework for delivering resources for students with special education needs. Alberta Ed has approved a plan to develop policy, accountability measures and a new distribution model for special education funding. This will involve extensive research, data analysis and consultation with education stakeholders, including school authorities, professional organizations, advocacy groups, and those who employ or educate our students after they leave basic education.

The project will begin this month, and implementation of the new framework will be determined at a later date. Update on the Principal Quality Standard Stakeholder Advisory Committee

The Principal Quality Standard Stakeholder Advisory Committee had its final meeting on November 21, 2007. At this meeting the committee received information that senior officials in Alberta Education were recommending that the working draft of the Principal Quality Practice Standard be endorsed and voluntarily implemented by all education stakeholders as a document to inform principal practice. After a long discussion the advisory committee unanimously agreed that the working draft be forwarded to the minister of education with a recommendation that he approve the document as the provincial standard for principal practice.

At its December meeting, the ATA Provincial Executive Council passed a motion for President Frank Bruseker to send a letter to the minister of education urging him to approve the advisory committee's working draft as the provincial standard for school principals. That letter has been sent; however at the time of publication, there has been no response from the minister. The advisory committee's final draft of the *Principal Quality Practice Standard: School Leadership in Alberta* can be accessed on the

Early in January the Association was invited to name 12 representatives, 10 of whom should be teachers, to attend a one-day symposium on school leadership being organized by Alberta Education. The Council on School Administration (CSA) received an invitation to send two representatives to the symposium. On January 9, the Association received notification that the symposium had been postponed and will likely be rescheduled for a date following the provincial election.

As more information becomes available, it will be shared with school administrators in Leadership Update. In the meantime the Association continues to provide workshops that support the leadership dimensions outlined in the draft standard.

Dr Bennett will challenge your thinking, raise critical questions and provide a unique perspective on issues of concern to all educators.
