International education exchange program

Short-term administrator exchanges are available as two-week job shadow experiences for Alberta school leaders. Participants are billeted by exchange counterparts and work shadow in an exchange partner's school for one to two weeks. Participants then host their counterparts for one to two weeks so they can experience the Alberta education system. Administrators arrange cultural visits to correspond with the interests of both parties. Opportunities exist in Australia, Germany, Spain, Denmark and the United Kingdom. Exchanges occur during the summer months and counterparts are usually hosted in September or October. Participants require an Alberta Permanent Professional Teaching Certificate and superintendent approval. For a successful, engaging experience, participants should be flexible, adaptable, positive, open to other cultures and comfortable with ambiguity. Once you have entered the nomination site, you will be asked to make a short comment related to your nominee's leadership in each of Alberta's Principal Quality Leadership dimensions. The deadline for nominations is midnight, April 1, 2016. All nominees must be active members of the Council for School Leadership to be eligible to receive the award.

What will I need to do?

- Once you have entered the nomination site, you will be asked to make a short comment related to your nominee's leadership in each of Alberta's Principal Quality Practice Leadership dimensions.
- You will be asked to provide an indication that your nominee has consented to being nominated (required) and provide the nominee's school name, school telephone number and e-mail address. Your nominee must be a

- member of the Council for School Leadership to be eligible to receive the award. Nominees can join the CSL now at **bit.ly/joincsl**.
- You will then be asked to write several sentences as supporting evidence for your nominee's leadership for each of Alberta's Principal Quality Practice Competencies including
 - fostering effective leadership,
 - · embodying visionary leadership,
 - leading a learning community,
 - providing instructional leadership,
 - developing and facilitating leadership,
 - managing school operations and resources and
 - understanding and responding to the larger societal context.

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Classroom walk-throughs

You will find some timely and well-thought-out ideas on a positive approach to daily walk-throughs by the well-known principal Chris Lehmann at http://practicaltheory.org/blog/2010/09/26/daily-walkthroughs-with-googleapps-and-the-ipad/. Chris shares some ideas about how school leaders can approach the role of ongoing supervision in a way that builds up both the teacher and the school leader while enhancing their relationship at the same time.

In our last issue of *Leadership Update* we shared that, as a wise principal, you know the supervision of teachers is

relationship-based, complex, contextual and multifaceted. No one can simplify supervision and sell it to you in a box or as an app. Implementation of supervisory practices requires flexibility, encourages risk-taking by teachers and administration, encourages creativity and problem solving rather than compliance with overly simplistic measures and checklists. Effective supervision promotes teacher collaborative networks and focuses discourse on optimizing learning experiences for students. All of this involves frequent observations of the pedagogical

practices of the teachers in the school. Classroom walk-through practices typically get principals into classrooms often, so that is positive, but that is only the simple first step. What a principal does after that in order to weave networks, invite journeys of professional growth, motivate discourse about teaching and learning and promote pockets of good practice is the true art of supervisory practices. Teacher Growth, Supervision, Evaluation and Practice Review Workshop






Elections for CSL Treasurer (2016/2018) and CSL President Elect (2016/2017)

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
