# International Education Exchange Program

Chort-term administrator exchanges are available as two-week job shadow experiences for Alberta school leaders. Participants are billeted by their exchange counterparts and work shadow in their exchange partner's school for one to two weeks. Participants then host their counterparts for one to two weeks so they can experience the Alberta education system. Administrators should arrange cultural visits to correspond with the interests of both parties. Opportunities exist in Australia, Germany, Spain, Denmark and the United Kingdom. Exchanges occur during the summer months, and participants typically host their counterparts in September or October. Participants require an Alberta Permanent Professional Teaching Certificate and the approval of their superintendent. For a successful, engaging experience, participants should be flexible, adaptable, positive, open to other cultures and comfortable with ambiguity. 
# Leadership Essentials for Administrators Conference, November 21–22

W/e are pleased to share some timely information about the Leadership Essentials for Administrators (LEA) conference taking place in Edmonton November 21–22. This conference is an annual event for school leaders (principals or assistant principals) serving in their first two years in the role and for administrators who have recently moved to Alberta from outside of the province. Two keynote presenters will appear at LEA this year. Carol Campbell will present the opening keynote address. Dr Campbell is associate professor of leadership and educational change at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE) at the University of Toronto, an appointed education advisor to the premier and the minister of education in Ontario, and director of the Knowledge Network for Applied Education Research (KNAER). She will present on how to lead with evidence for educational improvement. The closing keynote presenter for the conference, Simon Breakspear from Agile Schools in Australia, will speak about innovation for better learning. Breakspear's presentations are always wellreceived by Alberta school leaders. The LEA conference is a strong support to new school leaders in Alberta and will feature many concurrent sessions to assist those attending in their roles. The deadline for nominations is midnight, March 31, 2017. All nominees must be active members of the Council for School Leadership to be eligible to receive the award.

#### What will I need to do?

- Once you have entered the nomination site you will be asked to make a short comment related to your nominee's leadership in each of Alberta's Principal Quality Practice Leadership dimensions.
- You will be asked to provide an indication that your nominee has consented to being nominated (required) and provide the nominee's school name, school telephone number and email address. Your nominee must be a member of the Council for School Leadership to be eligible to receive

- the award. Nominees can join the CSL now at **bit.ly/joincsl**.
- You will then be asked to enter your supporting evidence (several sentences) for your nominee's leadership for each of Alberta's Principal Quality Practice competencies including
  - Fostering effective leadership
  - Embodying visionary leadership
  - Leading a learning community
  - Providing instructional leadership
  - Developing and facilitating leadership
  - Managing school operations and resources
  - Understanding and responding to the larger societal context

You will also be asked to describe a promising practice in leadership that your nominee, if selected to receive the award, would be prepared to share at a Council for School Leadership professional learning event in the following year.

# Part Three of a Three-Year Trilogy of uLead Summit Events

This year's uLead conference will be part three of a three-year trilogy of uLead summit events. At uLead 2015 we explored challenges and harm arising from the Global Education Reform Movement (G.E.R.M.) worldwide. At uLead 2016 we explored new narratives for education and school leadership emerging throughout the world and engaged in a conversation about how to make those narratives live within our schools, school districts and provinces.

This year the conference will seek to equip those attending with the tools to create their own education story that can thrive and meet the needs of today's students. 


# **Alberta Teachers** on iTunes U


